# ATTACHMENT A Racial Equity Narrative

### Section 1: Confirmation of Analyzation of Racial Composition of Target Beneficiaries

Family Promise's *Partners in Housing* PRICE project is set to amplify both new and existing systems-oriented affordable housing solutions aimed at addressing the root causes of inequity and racial economic injustice, with a particular emphasis on enabling the homeless to be housed, and equipping families with skills to ensure that the housing is long term, with a goal of permanency.

Most minority groups in the United States experience homelessness at higher rates than Whites, and therefore make up a disproportionate share of the homeless population. African Americans make up 13 percent of the general population, but more than 40 percent of the homeless population. Similarly, American Indians/Alaska Natives, Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders, and people who identify as two or more races make up a disproportionate share of the homeless population. Hispanics make up a share of the homeless population approximately equal to their share of the general population. (National Alliance to End Homelessness <a href="https://endhomelessness.org">https://endhomelessness.org</a>) Consistent with national trends and concerns, Family Promise has found that over 50% of families it currently serves are households of color, significantly representative of Black/African American, Native Hawaiian, and Hispanic households.

**As demonstrated detailed in Section 5 of this Appendix A,** Family Promise has analyzed each 17 locales needs, including its racial composition and demographics of households expected to benefit from the proposed *Partners in Housing* grant activities. Sections 2 through 4, immediately following, provide reflections on core competencies and unique services to be implemented by Family Promise across all sites to address racial equity in PRICE activities.

Section 2: Identification of Potential Barriers to Equitable Benefit from Grant Activities We have identified potential barriers to serving communities of color equitably and have crafted unique services working to prevent, reduce, and eliminate these barriers. One common barrier across all sites is that the families served are extremely low-income, the majority experiencing homelessness at time of program entry. In addition to housing insecurity, inequities further present in employment and income attainment. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, on average, Black women were paid 64% of what non-Hispanic white men were paid in 2021. Like Latinas and Native women, Black women experience a substantially wider pay gap than all women because of the compounded effect of racism and sexism. Additionally, all families served face barriers such as inadequate and/or expensive childcare, lack of transportation (seven of the 17 communities are rural), back utility payments and previous evictions, traffic violations, and the overall lack of financial resources. Lastly, the Benefits Cliff plays a factor too in creating barriers for the clients to be served. The Benefits Cliff occurs when families receive benefits through a public assistance program. When their income increases, they then become ineligible to continue receiving benefits despite being unable to sustain their household. Many clients served by these 17 sites encounter the Benefits Cliff making it difficult for them to accept the raise as it financially impacts their family in the short-term.

### Section 3: Strategies in Prevention, Reduction and Elimination of Barriers

Family Promise, in illustrating its work with underserved communities, particularly Black and Brown communities, to design and operate programs that advance racial equity through affordable housing initiatives, employs several strategies to mitigate the obstacles exacerbated by racial inequality.

- Stabilization Services: Critical and unique to Family Promise, we provide Stabilization Services tailored to families, facilitating their journey towards obtaining and maintaining homeownership. Our approach is informed by the nationally renowned EMPath Economic Mobility Pathways coaching model (empathways.org) and Critical Time Intervention, ensuring effectiveness and impact. We help families strategize, achieve, and maintain personal goals across five key domains: family stability, well-being, education and training, financial management, and employment and career development. Recognizing the interconnectedness of life challenges, our program adopts a holistic approach to address multifaceted needs. By bridging the gap between immediate necessities (such as food, daycare, transportation, and housing) and sustainable housing solutions in manufactured units, our program offers vital support to families exiting or at risk of homelessness.
- Strategic Project Location Selection: Environmental justice advocates for fair and equitable distribution of environmental benefits and burdens. By selecting 17 sites across 9 states, our *PIH* program contributes to this goal by providing low-income and marginalized communities increased access to affordable, safe, and sustainable housing options, thereby reducing disparities in environmental quality, and promoting social equity. Sites will ensure manufactured housing is proximate to employment opportunities, public transportation wherever possible, and childcare options. Each targeted community ensures that our PRICE activities benefit low- to moderate-income (LMI) individuals, the majority of which on average will directly benefit people of color while addressing each state's and community's pressing demand for increased affordable housing options.
- Empowering Homeownership and Wealth Building (Debt-Free Housing Model Solution): Our approach through our *Partners in Housing* program works to remove the barrier of consumer credit ratings by transferring ownership of the housing unit without the need for a mortgage. This affordability not only makes homeownership more attainable but also reduces the financial burden on families, allowing them to allocate resources towards other essential needs. Within each selected community, the financial feasibility of residing in a manufactured home -paying solely lot rent substantially outweighs traditional apartment rental or the combined expenses of lot rent and a mortgage, thereby ensuring affordability for a minimum of 15 years. Scaled investments in expanded housing portfolios, providing safe housing without mortgages will enable more families to achieve the dream of homeownership, leading to a more inclusive and equitable communities.
- Hiring Practices & Staff Training: Family Promise's commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion is woven into the core values and programmatic work at the 17 locations, across 9 states. To uphold principles of diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility, we provide comprehensive training for our board, staff, and volunteers. Our commitment to inclusion actively engaging low-income individuals in hiring, training, and contracting opportunities, with notably over 80% of Family Promise staff and board members having experienced homelessness themselves, ensures that families can trust in our culturally responsive, respectful, and inclusive services, delivered by staff who are attuned to and respectful of diverse cultural standards, beliefs, and practices.

• Community Engagement: Through inclusive communication, continuous feedback and improvement practices, and in-depth training, we demonstrate our dedication to ensuring that all families are treated with dignity, respect, and understanding. Specifically, we have enacted Family Advisory and Racial Advisory Councils across our locations working to ensure insights on programming, policies, and procedures, holding ourselves accountable for ensuring diverse voices are heard and that we are implementing our inclusive values into policies and practices. Every site monitors progress through assessments, feedback loops, and client satisfaction surveys. All sites will include client feedback in programmatic decisions.

## Section 4: Measurement and Effectiveness Plans to Advance Racial Equity

Family Promise collects data on program outcomes disaggregated by race and ethnicity to monitor progress and identify areas for improvement. This commitment to data-driven decision-making works to ensure accountability and help Family Promise continually refine its strategies for advancing racial equity.

All sites review agency performance measures for all households served as well as data disaggregated by race, ethnicity, and gender identity. Family Promise collects the data at the national level as well. This data is compared against community-level data sources such as HMIS reports and the Point in Time count (PIT) to ensure that we are serving households comparatively to those who are experiencing homelessness in the wider community.

At each site, measures are in place to track PRICE program equity impacts, through the following:

- Clear Objectives and Goals: Before implementing programs, clear, measurable objectives and goals that are specific to the needs and priorities of communities of color are established. These objectives serve as benchmarks for tracking progress and effectiveness.
- **Demographic Data Collection:** Demographic data is collected, including race, ethnicity, and other relevant factors. This data helps assess whether programs are reaching and engaging communities of color as intended.
- **Surveys and Feedback Sessions:** Feedback loops ensure that information is gathered from program participants through surveys, focus groups, or interviews. Sites ask about client experiences, satisfaction levels, and perceived impact of the program on their lives and/or communities.
- Utilization of Case Studies and Success Stories: Our sites document and share success stories and case studies that highlight the positive impact of programs on individuals or communities, with goals of discerning experiences by people of color. These stories provide valuable insights into program effectiveness and help demonstrate tangible outcomes.
- Continuous Evaluation and Improvement: Throughout its work plans, Family Promise maintains a process of continuous evaluation and improvement to assess program effectiveness over time. Data is regularly reviewed, and feedback solicited at the local level, as well as aggregated to discern impacts at the national level. This leads to program adaptation to best meet the community needs.
- Community Partners Collaborations: Convening with, and executing activities partnered with community-based organizations, leaders, and stakeholders leads to insights into the unique challenges and opportunities facing communities of color; stakeholders are engaged in program planning, implementation, and evaluation processes.

### **Section 5: Racial Equity Considerations by Activity Site**

Family Promise has analyzed the racial composition and demographics of households expected to benefit from the proposed *Partners in Housing* grant activities, building upon information and approached provided in Sections 1 through 4, site specific barriers and approaches to mitigate them are expressed across the following 17 locations:

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#### Arizona

### **Maricopa County:**

This site tracks the racial make-up of families that are part of their programming. The majority of households served are Black/ African American (60%), yet they make up less than 7% of Maricopa County. Recent trends have demonstrated that 15-20% of those served are Caucasian and 10-20% Latino. This site acknowledges that the proportion of minority groups served within their shelter program exceeds the representation of these groups in the general population. The significance of this *Partners in Housing* program is that it will allow these groups to build assets that make a generational impact.

Barriers to service anticipated include:

- Native language other than English
- High population of prospective residents (80%) from the BIPOC community who traditionally do not have a high home ownership rate/experience
- High percentage of single moms (70%) who are low-income and severely cost-burdened

The barriers will be addressed by:

- Monitoring of demographic data and racial breakdowns
- Addressing language barriers; there are 2 bi-lingual case managers on staff
- Continuing cash flow training that helps parents to budget their income and expenses over a 15-week period. Families have reported that they continue to run financials by peers to aid big decisions after exiting from program.
- Accessibility and accommodations within mobile homes for disabled persons; for current housing projects, this site has ensured ADA compliance for some of their housing units.
- Having lived experience on staff (single moms, previously homeless, socio-economic status closely mirroring clients)

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### **Delaware**

### **Sussex County:**

This site tracks racial composition of families currently assisted in their Prevention Program and will do the same for the *Partners in Housing* program. The Housing Authority Needs Assessment noted that "bad or low credit is a major barrier to homeownership, and this is more prevalent among certain households: 48% of Black renters and 42% of Hispanic renters reported credit score as the reason for continuing to rent compared to 27% of Non-Hispanic White respondents". The Needs Assessment also suggests the following:

• To maintain the state's homeownership rate across income ranges and keep up with growth, production of at least 800 ownership units a year is affordable to households with incomes of less than 100% AMI. This site will contribute 25 units toward this goal.

• To address gaps in homeownership by race and ethnicity, targeted down payment assistance coupled with affordable homeownership products to facilitate ownership for the more than 34,000 renters who express high levels of interest in owning a home, even with equity gain restrictions. This site will do just that by gifting the title of the manufactured housing unit to the family.

To address the barrier of credit, credit scores will not be used to determine eligibility into the program. Once in the program, assisting families with credit repair and financial stability will be one of the hallmarks of the housing counseling and stabilization services. In the year working together and preparing for the title transfer, the Case Manager will work with families to address financial stability and long-term planning moving forward. This program removes the need for immediate credit to obtain home ownership.

#### Florida

### **Alachua County:**

The community is grappling with an affordable housing crisis, particularly affecting single parents and exacerbating homelessness. The lack of affordable housing options, especially for low to moderate-income African American families, is glaring. Many struggle to secure safe and affordable housing for less than \$1200 a month. Disturbingly, despite comprising only 8% of the population, African American families account for 28% of families with children facing homelessness in the service area.

In Gainesville (Alachua County) alone, over 1,000 children within the school system are identified as homeless, not accounting for parents or younger siblings not yet in school. This crisis takes a toll on children, manifesting in higher rates of chronic and acute health issues, a doubled likelihood of using emergency rooms, a 43% non-attendance rate in schools, and a ninefold increase in the likelihood of being held back compared to their "housed" peers. Many families experiencing homelessness stem from backgrounds of generational poverty, residing in areas lacking educational and homeownership opportunities. Recognizing education and homeownership as vital pathways, addressing these challenges becomes crucial for transitioning families from generational poverty to generational wealth.

This site will address these barriers by providing two-generational case management. The staff will work with both the head of households and the children in the *Partners in Housing* program. The site will also ensure that the rental payments toward lot rents are more affordable than the rental payments for an apartment or housing in the community.

### Gadsden, Madison, and Taylor Counties:

Supported by a single-Family Promise affiliate, this site has analyzed the three counties that will be prioritized for this PRICE project (DATAUSA statistics):

- **Gadsden County:** Black citizens are more than 4-times as likely to live in poverty (over 30% of Black households live in poverty compared to approximately 6%).
- **Madison County**: The largest demographic living in poverty are Females head of household 25 44 and Black households are 39% more likely to live in poverty than white households.
- **Taylor**: The most common racial or ethnic group living below the poverty line is White, followed by Black households.

This site will target vulnerable families in zip codes of poverty. According to the Fair Housing Center for Rights and Research blanket bans on applicants with past evictions have a particularly disproportionate impact on Black women; 1 in 5 of whom experience an eviction filing at some point in their lifetime.

Additionally, this site will concurrently address a coordinated effort via participating in the Big Bend COC which brings together all the nonprofits and businesses supporting people moving from homelessness to housing. The site has formal and informal MOUs in place such as our existing HUD-funded Home Base program for households ages18-25 who are struggling with housing. Additionally, financial literacy training for all clients will be offered. We are also aware of HUD's Proposed Rule on Reducing Barriers to HUD-Assisted Housing. As an organization, this site accepts persons with criminal backgrounds unless it is not in the best interest of the household.

This site tracks effectiveness at removing barriers and inequities by:

- Placement by race and sex (higher need for females)
- Placement of persons and stability in income
- Placement with criminal/eviction background

### **Orange County & Polk County:**

This site's current racial composition for program beneficiaries is as follows: 75% Black/African American, 16% Bi-racial, 7% Caucasian, 1% Asian, 1% Other. This site serves a disproportionate number of families who are people of color compared to the composition of the overall communities. Similarly, the composition of households served by PRICE will be similar since the clients are selected from this site's shelter program. As with the other sites, this site ensures that the Board of Directors and staff composition are reflective of the clients served.

All programs including *Partners in Housing* support families to overcome their barriers to housing and employment so they can become productive and successful members of the community. This site finds that many of the barriers the clients face is related to poverty and having extremely low incomes. It is acknowledged that communities of color have a long history of facing discrimination and oppression especially related to accessing housing. In addition, predatory lending has disproportionately affected communities of color resulting in higher eviction rates. All families served have several barriers that stand in their way of securing housing; however, individuals of color have additional barriers that they must eliminate to reach the same goal.

Like other sites, this site intends to address the barriers by assigning each family a case manager. The case managers work with our families to achieve their goals for housing, job training, employment, and asset building so they can secure safe, affordable housing. The case manager is an advocate for the client families working with them to negotiate salaries, increase their credit and reduce their debt. Families are encouraged to improve their job skills and earning potential. This site has strong relationships with other nonprofits in the community who work with our client families. These nonprofits include Charity Cars who have donated several cars to our

client families – eliminating the transportation barrier. The site also works with 4C, who assists with childcare for families.

#### Hawaii

## **Honolulu County**

Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islanders are overrepresented in the area to be served (PIT count, region 7). The targeted area is the 96792-zip code which includes 45% Native Hawaiian, 35% identify as two or more races, and 18.6% identify as Hispanic or Latino (U.S Census).

Barriers identified include Language barriers, transportation, accessing benefits, and legal challenges. This site intends to reduce or eliminate the barriers by:

- providing free of charge services,
- maintain a close relationship with Pacific Gateway Center, a local nonprofit that provides language resources and interpreters (at no cost to the client),
- partner with Legal Aid Society of Hawaii to connect clients with legal services when needed, and
- assists all clients in applying for public benefits if desired.

Since its founding, 22% of the families served by this site have been Native Hawaiian and 57% have identified as other Pacific Islander ethnicities. Through a partnership with a local nonprofit, this site provides free interpreters for non-English-proficient families during all meetings to ensure effective communication and equal access to information for families. They also make informational materials available in multiple languages.

To best serve these diverse communities, this site provides comprehensive staff and volunteer training, including on topics like trauma-informed care and Pacific Islander cultures and traditions. The site also encourages people of diverse backgrounds and lived experiences to serve on its staff, Board of Directors, and Family Advisory Council, where they can influence and improve programs.

#### Michigan

### **Kent County:**

Similar to other sites, families served will have incomes below 50% AMI and are HUD Level 1 or 2 homeless (literally homeless or at imminent risk of homelessness). This site defines low to moderate income based on Federal Poverty Guidelines and Area Median Income (AMI). Income and demographic information are captured on all families served. There are persistent racial disparities in homelessness locally. In 2023, Hispanic or Latino residents were twice as likely-and Black residents were eight times as likely- as white residents to experience homelessness. This site seeks to end homelessness for children and their families each day. They infuse diversity, equity, and inclusion measures throughout our strategic plan, in our staffing, and in PIH service offerings to promote racial equity in housing and service delivery. Served in PIH 2023, the racial composition of families was as follows: 59% Black or African American, 34% white, 4% other, and 3% unknown/undisclosed. Of the households served, 13% identified as Hispanic/Latino.

Most families consist of single, female headed households with two children under the age of six. A staggering 98% of individuals served by this site are well below 50% Area Median Income (AMI) and are HUD Level 1 or 2 (literally homeless or at imminent risk of homelessness), with more than 90% of families below the 30% AMI (extremely low income).

This site evaluates program outcomes and impacts using indicators tracked through the state HUD Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) and internal client services database. Case managers monitor services received, housing status changes, income, employment, and benefit connections. We assess housing stability at 6-, 12-, and 24-months post-program exit, guiding continuous improvement through regular evaluations. Client feedback, gathered through exit and satisfaction surveys, informs programming adjustments.

Their Program Evaluation Committee, reporting to the Board, reviews surveys quarterly. The families served are seen as the experts, whose voices are assured through a Consumer Advisory Council, consisting of former families served in shelter and the *Partners in Housing* program. The council advises and informs the site. Additionally, past heads of households have served on the Board of Directors. Data from HMIS and our database, along with program evaluations, drive PIH enhancements. Success is measured by families achieving goals, accessing community referrals, and maintaining permanent housing.

### **New Jersey**

### **Cumberland and Salem Counties:**

One subrecipient will provide the project in Cumberland and Salem Counties. This affiliate provides comprehensive case management services to all households served in homeless prevention, shelter diversion, and transitional housing programs. Services include:

- Creating a stability plan that addresses that identifies barriers to stable housing.
- Connecting households with government and community resources. List of resources attached to our application.
- Assistance completing applications for supportive services.
- Provide monthly financial literacy training.
- Weekly monitoring to keep households on track for successful completion.

This site aims to address and alleviate the challenges faced by people of color in accessing and benefiting from the proposed grant activities. These challenges include limited transportation options, barriers to accessing governmental benefits, and navigating disabling conditions. To tackle transportation obstacles, the site will provide resources such as bus passes, gas cards, and, where feasible, donated vehicles. Comprehensive case management support will be offered to ensure that families receive the governmental benefits to which they are entitled. Discrimination based on disabling conditions will be actively prevented, with a commitment to connecting households with essential community referrals and services. To maintain efficiency and accountability, the site utilizes a Salesforce Database to track household demographic information and document outcomes for all served households. Furthermore, in compliance with HUD requirements, a Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) is employed for households receiving funding from government grants.

### **Uniquely Cumberland County:**

In comparing the racial breakdown of those experiencing homelessness to the racial breakdown in the general population and those living in poverty, disparate impacts along racial lines are evident. According to the American Community Survey 2021 annual estimates prepared by the Census Bureau, about 153,627 people live in Cumberland County, and 12.2% (18,784 persons) of Cumberland County residents are living below the poverty line. There is a strong correlation between poverty and homelessness, however, the racial disparities evident in the counted population indicate that poverty alone does not determine who will experience homelessness.

The disparity in representation within the population experiencing homelessness as compared to the population experiencing poverty by race point to poverty being an inconclusive indicator of who will experience homelessness. Race rather than poverty appears to be a more predictive indicator of who will experience homelessness. Further analysis is necessary to understand the full scope of risk factors and protective factors for communities experiencing homelessness as they relate to race as an indicator. Within this context it is important to explore the impact of systemic racism on experiences of homelessness, both in terms of who is likely to become homeless, and how systems of care work to end homelessness.

- Persons identifying as Black or African American non-Hispanic/Latino are overrepresented in the population experiencing homelessness. While 17.8% of the general population, persons identifying as Black or African American are 29.1% of the population in poverty and 40.9% of the population identified as experiencing homelessness.
- Persons identifying as Black or African American non-Hispanic/Latino represent 47.6% of the sheltered population (staying in emergency shelter, or transitional housing) and 21.2% of the identified unsheltered population. Persons identifying as White non-Hispanic/Latino represent 27% of the sheltered population and 57.6% of the identified unsheltered population.

Disparities along racial and ethnic lines in the population experiencing homelessness are seen in several other areas including lack of governmental benefits, lack of transportation, and a disabling condition:

- 7% of persons identifying as White non-Hispanic/Latino and 3% of persons identifying as Black or African American non-Hispanic/Latino reported receiving no governmental benefits, as compared to 24% of persons identifying as Hispanic/Latino.
- The top reported barrier for persons identifying as White non-Hispanic/Latino and Black or African American non-Hispanic/Latino was Lack of Transportation (21% and 27%, respectively), whereas for persons identifying as Hispanic Latino, the top reported barrier was No ID/Documents (41%).
- 64% of persons identifying as White non-Hispanic/Latino indicated a disabling condition, as compared to 36% of persons identifying as Black or African American and 35% of persons identifying as Hispanic/Latino.

### **Uniquely Salem County:**

According to the American Community Survey 2021 annual estimates prepared by the Census Bureau, about 65,046 people live in Salem County, and 12% (7,991 persons) of Salem County residents are living below the poverty line. There is a strong correlation between poverty and homelessness, however, the racial disparities evident in the counted population indicate that poverty alone does not determine who will experience homelessness. Race rather than poverty

appears to be a more predictive indicator of who will experience homelessness. Within this context it is important to explore the impact of systemic racism on experiences of homelessness, both in terms of who is likely to become homeless, and how systems of care work to end homelessness. According to the 2020 US Census:

- Persons identifying as Black or African American non-Hispanic/Latino are overrepresented in the population experiencing homelessness. While 13.6% of the general population, persons identifying as Black or African American are 43.0% of the population in poverty and 32.8% of the population identified as experiencing homelessness.
- Persons identifying as Hispanic/Latino are also overrepresented in the population experiencing homelessness. While 10.5% of the general population, persons identifying as Hispanic/Latino are 30.5% of the population in poverty and 28.3% of the population identified as experiencing homelessness.
- Persons identifying as Black or African American non-Hispanic/Latino represent 12.5% of the sheltered population (staying in emergency shelter, or transitional housing) and 42.9% of the identified unsheltered population. Persons identifying as White non-Hispanic/Latino represent 37.5% of the sheltered population and 38.8% of the identified unsheltered population. Persons identifying as Hispanic/Latino represent 50.0% of the sheltered population and 18.4% of the identified unsheltered population.

Disparities along racial and ethnic lines in the population experiencing homelessness are seen in a number of other areas including the following:

- 38% of persons identifying as Black or African American and 30% of persons identifying as Hispanic/Latino reported being homeless for more than 1 year, compared to 25% of persons identifying as White non-Hispanic/Latino.
- Of persons identifying as White non-Hispanic/Latino, 19% reported receiving General Assistance, compared to 5% of persons identifying as Black or African American and 0% of persons identifying as Hispanic/Latino.
- 6% of persons identifying as White non-Hispanic/Latino and 5% of persons identifying as Black or African American reported receiving no governmental benefits, as compared to 40% of persons identifying as Hispanic/Latino.

### New Hampshire

# **Belknap County**

The demographic primarily served by this site is Caucasian/White (94% for the county). The next largest racial group is Asian (1.2%) and Hispanic (2.3%). The homeless population reflects this demographic breakdown for the region. Since the population being served is mostly Caucasian, people of color populations may be hesitant to seek services. This site will be prioritizing training to ensure diversity and cultural competency to aid in the access of services in terms of gender identity, sexual orientation, age, religion, and race/ethnicity regarding the board of the directors and staff.

Targeted outreach to minority groups will occur to provide visibility, transparency of services/organization, and build rapport. This site will provide culturally competent case management services, classes, and events. They will leverage DEIA/Cultural Competency training from Family Promise for staff and volunteers. This site will leverage the best practices of Family Promise derived from successes across our national network to track the progress of

removing these barriers. SMART goals will be woven into the strategic plan, data collection with occur to track case management.

### Hillsborough & Rockingham Counties

Managed by a single affiliate, these sites together enroll 55% of their Residential Program and Prevention Program are persons of color despite the population of the counties being over 70% white. They are a low barrier program, serving people of all races. Additionally, many individuals served have substance use disorders or other disabilities. It is anticipated the PRICE funded *Partners in Housing* program will similarly serve predominately BIPOC households.

This site prides itself on serving all people who cross their threshold, refusing no one, no matter their circumstances. They will provide families with resources most appropriate for them, to help them overcome barriers and attain their individual successes. A major barrier for this site is lack of transportation and a high cost of living. This site will address these major barriers by ensuring the manufactured housing units are near public transportation or that families have reliable means of transportation. Additionally, by working with families to increase their income and to transfer the title with no mortgage, the high cost of renting in NH will not be a challenge.

This site currently has a comprehensive metrics system internally to track all requirements of a low barrier organization. We have a dedicated database Administrator. Like the other project sites, they enter into HMIS, and work collaboratively with community partners to assess areas of greatest need and plan our programming to serve those needs.

### **North Carolina**

### **Wake County:**

According to the Point in Time Count of 2023, the majority (67%) of homeless persons in the identified as African American. Furthermore, 46% of African Americans experiencing homelessness were in emergency shelter, while 10% were in transitional housing, and 44% were unsheltered.

A barrier to persons or communities of color equitably benefitting from the proposed grant activities is that the median household income for Black households and Hispanic households is less than the median household income of non-Hispanic white households (Staticalatlas.com). We will ensure the income is not a barrier to receiving services. This site will ensure the housing is affordable for households below 50% AMI which are disproportionately families of color.

This site tracks family demographics including but not limited to family size, income, race, and ethnicity.

### **Texas**

### **Bell County**

The majority of the people and households served through this project site are expected to come from the two lowest income census tracts in Bell County, identified as Opportunity Zones. The minority percent in tract 209 is 61% and in tract 208 is 82% (Federal Financial institutions Examination Council data). The median family income is \$30,000 compared to the statewide median family income of \$66,000. The percent living below the poverty line is 54% (tract 209)

and 37% (track 208). We must acknowledge these income disparities for certain racial and minority groups.

Anticipated barriers include equitable access to information. It is important to acknowledge that people or communities of color may encounter obstacles when trying to access crucial information about grant activities, application procedures, and eligibility criteria. These barriers could stem from language differences, limited availability of technology or internet access, or insufficient outreach efforts directed towards these communities. Addressing these disparities is essential for promoting inclusivity and ensuring that everyone has equal opportunities to participate in grant programs.

This site will also address geographic disparities: It is important to recognize that persons or communities of color often reside in geographically isolated or underserved areas. These circumstances can create significant challenges when it comes to accessing grant-funded programs, services, or resources. By acknowledging and actively working to overcome these barriers, we can strive to ensure equitable access to opportunities for all individuals and communities, regardless of their geographical location.

This site is committed to fostering partnerships with governmental agencies, nonprofit organizations, and faith institutions that serve and uplift people and communities of color. They will actively collaborate with these entities to ensure that individuals and communities of color are connected with the support and resources they need. Referrals will be welcomed from partners as we work together to serve and empower people and communities of color in Bell County.

Committed to serving people and communities of color who may face language barriers, this site will ensure language access services are readily available. This includes providing translation and interpreter services to facilitate effective communication. Additionally, they will establish community partnerships with community-based organizations, ethnic associations, immigrant support groups, and cultural centers. Through these collaborations, non-English speaking populations will be reached and culturally and linguistically appropriate services will be offered.

Finally, our Bell County site is committed to conducting routine analysis of program recipients to ensure equitable access and participation. They will compare demographic data of program users to the ethnic and racial breakdown of Bell County as a whole to align program usage with the diversity of the county, striving for inclusivity and representation without significant disparities.

We make intentional efforts to recruit volunteers from, and to visit areas where Black and Brown communities thrive, understanding the importance of representation and inclusivity.

- With thousands of volunteers and over 13,000 local partnerships nationwide, Family Promise prides itself on prioritizing community engagement, placing a strong emphasis on engaging a diverse range of stakeholders in our mission, and ensuring notification of service opportunities. Picture our ability to ensure that thousands of people will be talking about housing, in those one-on-one trusted, personalized moments that are much more effective in notifying disenfranchised populations about the opportunity to apply for our PRICE funded Partners-in-Housing homes. Church bulletins, information boards at community centers, and more will fill with announcements of PRICE homeownership opportunities.
- In addition to our existing partnerships with local government, nonprofits, and faith-based organizations, we actively maintain collaborations with Continuums of Care and fair housing organizations serving each targeted community. These connections work to ensure equitable access to housing opportunities for all individuals and families. These partnerships provide us with additional avenues to market PRICE opportunities.
- We also intentionally engage with LGBTQ+ individuals, and those with disabilities by actively seeking their input and involvement, striving to address their unique needs and challenges. Public announcements of housing opportunities will be made to Equality Texas, Equality Arizona, Equality Michigan, Equality Florida, Equality Hawai'i, New Hampshire Freedom to Marry Coalition, and other LGBTQ+ advocate organizations. Similarly, advocacy groups for people with disabilities are notified of housing opportunities, including Disability Advocates of Kent County, Michigan, Florida Center for Inclusive Communities, Disability Rights North Carolina, and Ability Network of Delaware to name a few.
- Our staff actively participates in local social service committees and Continuums of Care (CoCs) ensuring that CoC's within each targeted community are aware of our housing opportunities, leveraging their ability to quickly inform those who are literally homeless or at imminent risk of homelessness when housing becomes available.

English as Second Language Outreach: But the outreach does not stop there. *Partners-in-Housing* recognizes the diversity within each of our target communities, including individuals

Family Promise takes meaningful actions to address significant disparities in housing needs across the county, not only by expanding the inventory of affordable housing but also empowering homeless and low-income families to attain secure, affordable housing and achieve homeownership.

### **Material Impact: Community Transformation**

Our activities transform communities with racially and ethnically concentrated areas of poverty into areas of opportunity through significant actions, including creating new manufactured housing communities with covenants to ensure housing affordability for generations to come. Our multifaceted approach, including families having comprehensive housing counseling services, underscores a commitment to promoting successful homeownership among underserved populations. By implementing measures like long-term leases and advance notice of community sales, Family Promise fosters a sense of security and continuity for residents, mitigating the risk of displacement and promoting community cohesion.

### Material Impact: Equitable Opportunities to Affordable Housing

By strategically allocating PRICE resources across 9 states and 17 communities, we are strategic in selecting communities lacking in affordable, accessible housing to meet the needs for people, including single, female headed households of color, significantly representative of Black/African American, Native Hawaiian, and Hispanic households. By targeting communities where these populations are disproportionately affected, Family Promise is addressing systemic inequalities and promoting fair housing principles. Our efforts include facilitating the acquisition of manufactured housing communities in Kent County, Michigan, and Honolulu, Hawaii. By directly overseeing lot rent controls and safeguarding affordability for 15 years in each location, Family Promise is ensuring sustained access to affordable housing for LMI households. Our project areas also include 'distress area' and 'disaster-prone area' designated communities.

### Material Impact: Reduction of Homelessness; Stabilized Households

By working with families from all compositions who are below 80% of the Area Median Income (AMI) and predominantly falling within the 30% AMI threshold, Family Promise ensures that its services are accessible to those most in need, irrespective of socioeconomic status. We are uniquely equipped to serve families with children, particularly those facing homelessness or imminent risk of eviction, demonstrating a targeted effort to addressing the needs of vulnerable populations disproportionately affected by housing insecurity. Importantly, Family Promise's project aligns with the National Objective of benefiting low- and moderate-income (LMI) clientele, specifically targeting low- and extremely low-income households. Our *Partners in Housing* program operates on a dual-pronged approach, focusing on expanding the pool of safe, affordable housing options for low- and extremely low-income families, while additionally, providing comprehensive housing counseling services to guide families along the path to homeownership and sustainable self-reliance. Our Stabilization Services are informed by the nationally renowned EMPath Economic Mobility Pathways coaching model. This approach, focused on five key domains including family stability, well-being, education and training, financial management, and employment and career development, reflects a commitment to

addressing the holistic needs of families in transition. Moreover, Family Promise employs a family-centered, two-generational approach, actively involving the entire family in the program to address their unique circumstances and challenges. Cultural responsiveness is also prioritized, with staff delivering services that respect diverse cultural standards, beliefs, and practices.

### **Material Impact: Home Ownership**

Family Promise's initiatives address the systemic barriers to affordable housing access faced by vulnerable populations, particularly BIPOC communities, by facilitating homeownership without traditional mortgage burdens. Our unique model of gifting of the title to families upon program completion significantly reduces financial strain compared to traditional housing arrangements, reducing/removing the dual pressure of mortgage/rent payments and lot rent. By retaining the first right to purchase homes, Family Promise ensures that future homeowners will be individuals from low- and severely low-income backgrounds, thus safeguarding affordability and promoting socioeconomic diversity within neighborhoods. Additionally, our provision of tenancy courses equips families with the knowledge and skills to advocate for their rights effectively.

### **Material Impact: Empowered, Engaged Communities**

By conducting targeted outreach efforts and implementing culturally sensitive programming, Family Promise builds trust and rapport with underserved populations, including marginalized communities, people of color, LGBTQ+ individuals, and those with disabilities. The provision of language interpretation services, culturally relevant resources, and the creation of safe and welcoming spaces underscores their commitment to inclusivity and diversity. Importantly, Family Promise empowers the families we serve by involving them in defining their goals and priorities through tools like EMPath's Mobility Mentoring and Bridge to Self-Sufficiency. By soliciting feedback through client satisfaction surveys, Family Promise continuously adapts and improves its services to better meet the needs of the community. Moreover, the provision of comprehensive case management services for up to two years ensures that families receive the support they need to achieve long-term housing stability. This personalized approach addresses not only immediate housing needs but also equips families with the tools and resources necessary to build resilience and self-sufficiency, furthering fair housing goals by promoting economic empowerment and social inclusion.

We prioritize diversity, equity, and inclusion through the establishment of Family Advisory Councils and Racial Advisory Councils across our locations, reflecting the communities we serve and working to dismantle systemic barriers to fair housing. Family Promise's commitment to racial justice is evident through its National Racial Justice Council and the establishment of Family Advisory Councils at local sites, ensuring a trauma-informed and equitable approach to their work. 80% of our sites have staff or board members with lived experience of homelessness. By engaged collaboration and through multiple channels and platforms, Family Promise builds support, fosters collaboration, and cultivates a sense of shared responsibility for addressing homelessness within communities nationwide.



### Note:

As we feverishly work to compose this application, match commitments are being explored however have not been finalized, preventing us from meeting the necessary HUD standard for including match presently. For example, in a demonstration of our mutual dedication to combatting family homelessness and addressing the affordable housing crisis, Clayton has graciously pledged to donate 16 manufactured homes to Family Promise over the course of several years. We are currently in discussion of their ability to bring these donations to bear in our targeted PRICE communities. There is a high probability of this occurring as 10 out of the 17 communities selected for the PRICE grant initiative are strategically located near Clayton Homes facilities. However, we are not able to finalize this for match purposes at this time.

Additionally, each year, Family Promise facilitates vital support for our affiliate partners by allocating over \$2 million from our national donor network. As a conduit, we provide grants to our affiliates, which they can amplify with matching funds ranging from 25% to 100%, depending on the availability of donor contributions. While we anticipate that some of these funds will be directed towards PRICE activities, we are currently unable to designate specific locations due to timing constraints. Nonetheless, sites funded by PRICE will receive priority consideration for our annual gift challenges throughout the six-year period.

Finally, at individual sites, Family Promise is actively working to develop and source infusions of cash and in-kind resources to our PRICE *Partners in Housing* project, or in tandem with PRICE, seeding the expansion of shelter and supportive services, to meet the escalating crisis of homelessness, including:

- Family Promise Southwest NJ: Working with a real estate developer to commit to funding one house a year (new construction or renovated) and gifting such to a family experiencing homelessness, for at least the next three years to expand affordable housing. This projected value is over \$200,000.
- Family Promise in Gainesville, FL: Seeking \$289,520.40 through City of Gainesville to assist in rapid rehousing of families in homelessness.
- Family Promise in Bell County, TX: Evaluating their ability to put cash reserves toward this project, in an amount between \$200,000 and \$800,000.
- Family Promise in Big Bend, FL: Actively pursuing partners such as Lowe's, Bank of America, and Walmart to provide a dedicated and equipped (e.g. tools, paint, etc.) volunteer force for renovations.

Although specific site allocations for these commitments haven't been finalized, preventing us from meeting the necessary HUD standard for including these investments as matches presently, we believe it is vital to outline and inform you of our intentions to leverage PRICE funding in these capacities.
